

The seventh annual Stroud Book Festival is almost here!

Our ambition each year is to produce a programme with a distinctly Stroud flavour that will entertain, start conversations, help us grapple with world events, spark joy, and celebrate the myriad possibilities of the written word. We hope very much that you'll find something to whet your reading appetite as you look through this programme.

In light of the cost of living crisis, we have maintained ticket prices at £10 for most adult events, whilst the majority of our children's events are now £6 a ticket (a small rise of £1, but still competitive compared with other festivals).

We are committed to encouraging and enabling as broad an audience as we can to attend our events, and for the first time this year will be working with local parish councils and charities to make a number of free tickets available.

This 25th event from the brilliant Stroud Short Stories, run by John Holland, brings an evening of short stories on the theme of TIME, written and read by Gloucestershire authors; some professional writers, some skilled amateurs, some complete beginners.

Now in its 11th year and proclaimed by Cheltenham Literature Festival as 'possibly the best short story event in the South West', SSS's considerable reputation is based on the unfailingly high quality of the stories read at its events.

Ten stories are selected for each event from the hundred or so submitted. John's co-judge for this event is the award-winning short story author and four times SSS reader, Chloe Turner.

Nomad Century: How to Survive the Climate Upheaval Gaia Vince

"A great upheaval is coming. It will change us and our planet," says science writer **Gaia Vince**, the first solo woman to win the Royal Society Science Book of the Year Prize. That upheaval will come as a consequence of the climate emergency, and the fact that huge swathes of the world are swiftly becoming unhabitable. For every degree of temperature rise, a billion people will be displaced. But, she says, we can survive this crisis if we start planning now for a deliberate human migration northwards.

Join Gaia for an illuminating in-conversation event based on her book, *Nomad Century: How to Survive the Climate Upheaval*, in which she draws on a wealth of scientific research and her travels to argue that migration is not only necessary but has historically enabled humans to survive and prosper, and can do so again. 

Can we as individuals untangle ourselves from a past that binds us to the suffering and deeds of our predecessors?






On the evening of Halloween in 2015, 20-year-old Morgan Hehir was out with friends in his hometown of Nuneaton when they were attacked by a group of strangers. Morgan was stabbed in the heart and lungs and died hours later.

In the aftermath of Morgan's murder, his father Colin kept a diary of his family's grief, the eventual murder trial, and his fight to expose the shocking fact that a young man with a history of violence was at liberty to take his son's life. It was this extraordinary record which, with the family's blessing, journalist and novelist **David Whitehouse** used as the foundation for *About a Son*, a compelling work that is both deeply respectful and superbly crafted.

2022 marks the 80th anniversary of the pivotal Second World War battle of Stalingrad, one of the bloodiest engagements in the history of warfare. Highly praised by James Holland, Jonathan Dimbleby, William Boyd and others, **lain MacGregor's** immersive account of the battle, *The Lighthouse of Stalingrad* draws on hitherto unseen documents from German and Russian archives to provide eyewitness testimonies from both sides.

Painting a truer picture of how the battle ended and focusing on a key frontline building codenamed The Lighthouse, MacGregor shows how the Great Patriotic War tropes surrounding the battle perpetuate in Putin's Russia. And he reveals that it was a Ukrainian general who took the final German surrender.





















When Words Are Not Enough: Creative Responses to Grief

Jane Harris, Jimmy Edmonds & Kathryn Mannix

Everyone grieves for someone at some point in their lives. But how do we find ways to express painful feelings when words are not enough?

Psychotherapist **Jane Harris** and photographer and documentary film editor **Jimmy Edmonds** drew on their experience of loss after the death of their son Josh for *When Words Are Not Enough*. Taking in the experiences of 13 other bereaved people, the book also charts their founding of The Good Grief Project, a charity which promotes the understanding of grief as a creative process.

Joining Jane and Jimmy is retired palliative care doctor, **Kathryn Mannix**, author of another seminal book on grief, *With the End in Mind: How to Live and Die Well*. They will discuss how creativity can shape a future where the deceased still play a part. Jane and Jimmy will also show a short film they made to accompany the launch of the book.

Warrior Queens & Quiet Revolutionaries: How Women (Also) Built the World Kate Mosse

As founder of the Women's Prize and the #WomenInHistory campaign, novelist, playwright and non-fiction writer **Kate Mosse** has long championed the achievements of unheard, and under-heard women.

Warrior Queens & Quiet Revolutionaries draws both on her 40 years of activism and her discovery that she was walking in her great-grandmother's footsteps as a novelist. It celebrates the legions of women whose accomplishments deserve to be better known; from trailblazing women at the Bar to pirate commanders and women who fought for what they believed in. Threaded through it is the story of Mosse's great-grandmother, writer and activist Lily Watson.

In this fascinating event, Kate will tell us more about a book she says she has "been waiting to write for so many years".

My Pen is the Wing of a Bird: New Fiction by Afghan Women

Lucy Hannah & Zarghuna Kargar

A woman's fortitude saves her village from disaster. A tormented girl tries to find love through a horrific act. A headmaster makes his way to work, treading the fine line between life and death. Just some of the scenarios which feature in *My Pen is the Wing of a Bird*, a landmark first anthology of short fiction by Afghan women in English translation, which introduces the work of some extraordinary writers. 


Harold Fry & Maureen Fry Rachel Joyce & Juliet Dowling 19.30-20.30 | Lansdown Hall | £10
